A PRAGMATIC INTERPRETATION OF CORRUPTION- INFESTED NIGERIAN SOCIETY IN IKE CHUKWUEMEKA'S OUR CHILDREN ARE COMING

Abstract

The study x-rays the Nigerian society by looking at the confessional statements of the different characters in Ike Chukwuemeka's Our Children Are Coming! The novelist critically examined Nigerian society, especially through the prism of the political and the elite members of the society who are either leaders today or would-be leaders of tomorrow. The objectives of the study are to highlight the rot in the society perpetrated through corruption and moral decadence by the elite members of the society. This study aims to address societal ills by analyzing monologues and dialogues conversations in the novel in order to make the Nigerian society a better place for living. The methodology for this study involved extracting the monologues or self-confessional statements of the characters as well as the open confessions of the adults who appeared before: The Presidential Commission on Juvenile below Twenty-one Years and the young characters who appeared before: The National Commission on Parents Over Twenty-one Years. These statements were extracted and numbered appropriately for ease of analyses of their Implicature for good governance and corruption-free society. The theoretical framework of analysis is Grice's (1975) Conventional and Conversational Implicature of the statements. The findings revealed the extent of the rot in Nigerian society and the consequences on good governance and national development in Nigeria. The study has also shown that high level intellectualism does not guaranty high moral probity and corruption-free individuals. The study recommends the need for a national reorientation and rebirth for the elite youths and adults in the Nigerian society.

Introduction

Ike Chukwuemeka's *Our Children Are Coming* is a fascinating novel which x-rays the Nigerian society through a fictitious narration in book length by presenting characters and actions with some degree of realism. It is an extended work of narrative fiction usually written in prose and published as a book in 1990. According to Prahl, A. (2019), a novel is a narrative work of prose fiction that tells a story about specific human experiences over a considerable length or word count.

Ike Chukwuemeka's Our Children Are Coming mirrors the Nigerian society, especially the elite

by the political represented administrative office holders and their children represented by the juveniles below twenty-one years old or the educated young adults in the society. The novel is an advocacy against corruption and moral decadence being perpetrated by these sets of people mentioned above. The implications of the actions of these set of people in leadership positions today and the young adults who will take over leadership positions tomorrow, often referred to as "leaders of tomorrow" are highlighted in the novel. The rots of corruption and moral decadence so exposed in the novel showed that "The Beautiful Ones Are Not Yet Born."

Every facet of the society is guilty in one way or the other of the menace of corruption which is defined in various ways by different scholars. Gatung et al (2013) see corruption as "the use of public office for the purpose of personal gain" similarly, Hira et al (2016) see corruption as "...any breach of trust, malfeasance of intended duty, or failure to deliver in both practice and spirit for any agreement when the purpose is the gain of just one of the parties." Also, the United Nation Convention on corruption says that corruption represents a threat "...to the stability and security of societies, undermining the institution of democracy, ethical values and justice and jeopardizing sustainable development and the rule of law." This study is therefore motivated by the desire to expose these ills in the society by exploring pragmatics meaning to the statements resulting from the dialogues between the chairmen of the two commissions of inquiry and the witnesses who testify before them (that is, The Presidential Commission of Inquiry on Juveniles under Twenty-one Years and The Commission of Inquiry on Parents Over Twenty-one Years) as well as the press conference made by the President and 1st National Vice President of National Association of Students (NAS).

The study employed a pragmatic meaning because Yule (1996) sees Pragmatics as the study of "speaker's meaning". He further defines Pragmatics as the study of "invisible meaning or how we recognize what is meant even when it is not actually said or written". This means that meanings are derived from utterances or statements through shared assumptions between the speaker and the hearer. Leech (1983) sees Pragmatics as "the study of how utterances have meaning in situation". This implies that the speaker has the best way to accomplish his/her conversational aim through his/her use of language. In other words, Leech presents a complementarist view of pragmatics within an overall programme of studying language as a communication system. This means, studying the use of language as distinct from, but complementary to, the language itself seen as a formal system (Leech 1983:6).

Statement of the Research Problem

Researches are by nature, designed to solve

problems or help to reduce a raging incidence to its barest minimum. The Nigerian society is bedeviled with issues of corruption and moral decadence in almost all the facet of its life making one to wonder whether there is any array of hope in curbing the phenomenon. These problems have become so notorious in the Nigerian society such that the hopes of their eradication have become gloomy by each passing day. A lot of people have lost hope of and moral curbing corruptive tendencies decadence among the elite members of the society. There is a general apathy and disillusionment to campaigns against these dry-headed monsters called "corruption and moral decadence" in the society which have become so endemic either as a result of lack of political will to fight them or because of the general believe that everybody is involved. This study therefore, is aimed at bridging that gap by utilizing the rich resources of anticorruption and moral decadence in Chukwuemeka's Our Children Are Coming which have not been fully explored in campaigning against corruption-infested Nigerian society. The paper is a clarion call to draw the minds of the society back to the common enemies plaguing our through exploring a pragmatic interpretation of the statements in the dialogic conversations in the novel thereby showcasing the bad effects of corruption and moral decadence in Nigerian society. It is hoped that the leaders of today and those of tomorrow will x-ray themselves by this study and shone corruption in all its ramifications for the good of the society.

Objectives of the Study

This study is aimed at highlighting corruption and moral decadence in the Nigerian society as satirized in the novel through the following objectives:

- Highlight the corruptive activities perpetrated by the adult elites in the society, especially those occupying political and administrative leadership position in Ike Chukwuemeka's Our Children Are Coming!
- 2. Highlight the moral decadence perpetrated by the young elite members of the society also known as the juveniles below twenty-one years who are expected to be "leaders of tomorrow" as portrayed in Ike

- Chukwuemeka's Our Children Are Coming!
- 3. Interpret the Implicature of the utterances/statements against the adults and the juveniles in the Nigerian society as portrayed in Ike Chukwuemeka's *Our Children Are Coming!*

Significance of the Study

This research is very significant in the sense that it is tailored towards solving some of the major problems in the society by highlighting corruption as a cankerworm eating deep into the fabric of the Nigerian society and the moral rectitude among the youths. There is a nexus between corruption and bad governance and a corruption-free society and good governance. This study therefore is showcasing the bad effects of corruptive activities of both the young and the adult elite members of the Nigerian society with the aim of drawing consciousness to these bad activities for possible eradication or reduction for the survival of the society. There is a general lukewarm attitude to reading novels by a large percentage of the Nigerian society, despite the rich resources and messages inherent in novels. Some persons read novels just for pleasure and entertainment without thinking deeply about the didactic lessons to be learnt from them. This study therefore becomes very significant in that it exposes corruption perpetrated by "the leaders of today" and the moral decadence among "the leaders of tomorrow". This study presents Ike Chukwuemeka's Our Children Are Coming as a lens through which the elites political and administrative leaders or office holders could see themselves and reflect on their activities as either good or bad for the society. The study therefore is a campaign against corruption and moral decadence in the society and hopes to draw peoples' consciousness to these ills plaguing the Nigerian society, so that conscious efforts or measures can be taken to correcting or ameliorating the problems, which will in turn, help entrench a better society full of development for the good of all, instead of the good of an individual and his/her immediate family.

Literature Review

This paper reviewed linguistics studies on corruption with the view to show that linguists are concerned with the problems of corruption and moral decadence in the society. While some linguists advocate for waging war against corruption, others simply highlight the language of corruption without advocating for any action(s) against it.

Adegoju, A. (2003). Conducted a study entitled, "Corruption of Language and Nigeria's Debased Value System." He analyses what he calls "...language (ab)use evident in the Lexicosemantic constructions that are tactically deployed to configure and ...to conceal Nigeria's debased system." The study acknowledges the fact that the depravity of Nigeria's social order is alarming and unhealthy for national development and thinks that the linguistic options that Nigerians use to code all kinds of unacceptable behaviours are as threatening to the cause of national development as the practices themselves. The study proposes that "...any crusade that is geared towards sanitizing the Nigerian society should not be directed only at the manifestations of the country's perverse world-view but also at the linguistic expressions that serve as their 'life support' system." Adegoju's study is similar to the current study in many respects. The studies advocate for a crusade to sanitize the Nigerian society in order to achieve the desired national development; the studies also believe that corruption in every facet of the Nigerian society is alarming and disturbing, therefore, conscious efforts must be made to address them. The only point of divergence is that the earlier study did not say anything about moral decadence amongst the Nigerian youths.

Oboko, C. (2023). Conducted a study on "Contextualizing Language as a Tool of Value Degeneration: A Sociolinguistics Study of Language of Corruption in Nigeria." The study adopted a qualitative research design and a random sampling technique in selecting a total of one hundred respondents across the five south-eastern States (Anambra, Imo, Enugu, Ebonyi and Abia) in Nigeria. The paper anchored its analyses on the framework conceptual of Sapir-Whorfian Hypothesis which posits that our world-view is shaped by our languages. The analyses were done using interpretive textual analysis model to analyse the data collected from eight notable online newspapers such as The Vanguard, The Punch, The Guardian, This Day, The Premium,

The Sahara Reporters, Naira Land and others published between 2015 and 2021. The findings reveal that the use of words, phrases and expressions which are reflected in coinages, codemixing, reduplication, metonymy, metaphor, slang, borrowing, pidginisation, lexical reversal and creative usages mask corruption and these have far-reaching effects on national development. The paper recommends that the fight against corruption should pay attention to linguistic embellishments that act as lifeline for the negative practice to trend. The two studies have common ground on fighting corruption in the society for national development to thrive. However, the studies differ in their methodologies and approaches to the menace. While the reviewed study sees the use of language embellishment as an act that promotes corruption, the current study views corruption from both actions and language use of the adult members of the society in Ike Chukwuemeka's Our Children Are Coming! The current study also views moral decadence by the youths who are supposedly the "leaders of tomorrow" as a worrisome development which must be tackled today for the survival of tomorrow.

Bodomo., A. (2021). Examined "The Language and Literature of Corruption in West Africa." The researcher looked at some theoretical approaches to corruption and discussed in details "The Rational Choice Theory and Cognitive Science" explanation on corruption based on notions from Psychology, Political Psychology and Behavioural Economics. The study submits that the approach adopted does not involve waging war on corruption but to highlight the expressions used in Transactional Linguistic Cues on Corruption (TLCC) to promote corruption among some languages in West Africa. Some selected expressions are exemplified below:

West African English: "put weight on top"

Yoruba: "se owo kunduru si mi" translated as "hand something to me discreetly".

Ibo: "megharia ahu" translated as "shake/adjust body"

Akan: "ye biribi or hu yen kakra" translated as "do something or see us small"

Dagaare: "tung kore n ba" translated as "dip into your pocket"

Swahili: "toa ki ku kidogo" translated as "remove something small"

Hausa: "kasa yay i karfi, sheik a yi wani abu" translated as "the land is hard, you have to do something"

The study suggests that linguists and literary scholars can contribute to anti-corruption campaigns by identifying potential cases of corruption through the analysis of texts and using the methods to train anti-corruption staff. The current study is in agreement with the earlier study because we are using a literary text to analyse corruption in Nigerian society and using the text as a campaign or advocacy to reducing corruption in Nigerian society in order to pave way for national development.

Theoretical Framework

This study is based on the theoretical framework of Grice's (1975) concepts of conventional and conversational Implicature. The term Implicature is generally used by Grice (ibid) to account for what a speaker can imply, suggest, or mean, as distinct from what the speaker literally says. According to Grice (1975, p 44, in Awobi 2009, p 56), there are two types of Implicature:

- A) The Conventional Implicature, which arguably refers to plenty of linguistic and semantic aspects of language. It consists of a sort of specific literal meanings, which slightly differ from the implicature. conversational It determined by the conventional meaning of the words used. For example, "He is an Igboman, he is therefore industrious." The speaker does not directly assert that one property, "being industrious" follows from another property "being an Igboman", but the form of expression used conventionally implicates that such relation does hold (Awobi 2009, p 56).
- B) The Conversational Implicature: this is derived from a general principle of conversation plus a number of maxims which speakers will normally obey if they do not want to be seen to flout, violate or infringe in conversation. The Conversational Implicature propounded by Grice (1975), suggests that we often convey information beyond that which we

say and that the additional meaning is inferred and predictable. conversational maxims outlined by Grice are maxims of quantity, quality, relation, and manner. Although, this study is not exploring these maxims in details, the maxim of quality which has to do with telling a lie is mentioned where applicable in determining the type of Implicature employed to arrive at the finding of the study. The principles of conventional and conversational Implicatures are the pragmatic tenets of the linguistic study of Ike Chukwuemeka's Our Children Are Coming!

The Methodology of the Study

This study is a qualitative research in which the data for analyses are obtained from Ike Chukwuemeka's *Our Children Are Coming!* The method or procedure for data collection is done by identifying the speaker, the communicative

situation or context, the direct and indirect utterances which were assigned serial number and the interpretation of the utterances derived through conventional and conversational interpretations. The Implicature of the utterances/statements is discussed in the findings. The data presentation and analyses were done in line with the objectives of the study starting from the corruption and moral rectitude of the adult elites who are occupying various political and administrative positions as leaders, as testified by the youths to the National Commission of Inquiry on Adult above Twentyone Years. And the moral decadence exhibited by the young persons as testified to the National Commission of Inquiry on Juveniles under Twenty-one Years by their parents. The Implicature of the utterances was done through the conventional and conversational Implicature model of Grice (1975) which were applied to the bulk statements of the testifiers to derive the interpretations.

They perfected every plan for him and he came out with excellent results which gave him admission to study in his father's department in the university a year later. Studying in the department where his father is the HOD meant that the degree was already in his pocket even before he signed the matriculation register, because no lecturer would dare to fail the son of the HOD. "When it came to one-year compulsory youth programme, my mother took over. Apolonia represents very rotten girls on Nigerian university campuses who indulge in prostitution and using the proceeds to fend for their parents and siblings. They flirt around with top government officials who steal government money at their possession and squander lavishly on university girls. Such girls do not read their books only to approach lecturers for sorting with money and sex.

Discussion of Findings

This study applied conventional Implicature to arrive at its finding that witness 001's father, a professor and a medical scientist is corrupt and morally bankrupt by the attitudes that he exhibits-pettiness, inhumane and heartless character, irresponsible behaviour, deceitfulness, telling lies, selfish and inability to admit failure, fallibility and setting standards that he cannot fulfill p.209.

Another finding from the statements of witness 002 shows that the father is outwardly pure but inwardly rotten by his character. He is morally bankrupt as well by carrying girls about his daughter's age mate on official tour of three European countries. He is also a ritual killer, a reminiscent of today's political and administrative office holders who will stop at nothing to maintain their position. He is also a sex maniac and corrupt by squandering government resources lavishly through padded appropriation to his office. We arrived at this interpretation through the conventional Implicature of the statements/utterances of witness 002 p.214.

On serial no.3, the parents of witness 005 were full of manipulative tendencies and lies. The told their daughter that they were withdrawing her from England because of the exchange rate of the naira

to foreign currencies and so they cannot afford her school fees and maintenance in the UK. But, in reality, they were just scheming to prevent her from being married to foreign nationals because they prefer an Ekiti man to be her husband. This interpretation is done by a combination of both conventional and conversational Implicature p.227.

On serial no.4, witness 006 through his statement conventionally implicate that some academics, notably that some Professors got to the rung of their ladder by fraudulence means of plagiarism. The father and his colleagues got rapid promotion in rank and university positions through dubious manipulation of the system. Today, our universities are full of unqualified academic staff who got in through nepotism, political patronage and quota system. we arrived at these interpretations through the conventional and conversation Implicature of witness 006's statements p.243.

On serial no.5, this is an adult testifying against the moral rectitude of his son (Ayo junior). The father, Chief Ayodele Olabisi was doing everything possible to make Ayo a responsible person, being his only male child. But, Ayo is frustrating his father's efforts

through drinking, unseriousness with his studies and womanizing. To get Ayo out of troubles, Chief Olabisi indulges in bribery and lies and other corruptive activities. This interpretation is arrived at through his own confessional statement to the Presidential Commission of Inquiry on Juveniles under Twenty-one Years. Both conventional and conversational implicatures are involved in this finding p.26.

Serial no.6, are statements by The Very Reverend Jeremiah Chukwukadibia Obi who prefers to be called Archdeacon Obi. He narrated how his daughter had sent a message that she could not come home for Christmas because of a very important school assignment. Barely a week later, she breezed in, loaded with breathtaking presents for her parents, brothers and sisters: gold trinkets, eye-catching George materials, head ties etc. when she was asked about how she got the money for the gifts she brought to the house, she lied that a friend introduced her to a raffle draw and she won. At another time, she claimed to have been selected to attend a summer school in America and she used the allowances to buy a brand Peugeot 505SR fully air-conditioned saloon car for her parents. Through the father's statements we able to apply conventional conversational Implicature to interpret that she was sleeping around with professors for grade because she wasn't in school studying her books, but traveling with top government functionaries to UK and America, selling her body for which she receives handsome gifts and rewards p. 35.

Serial no. 7, are the statements of Prof Hassan Aliyu who testified how his son, Murtalla became unserious with his studies deliberately because he wanted to be sent abroad against the father's wish. Murtalla stole and sold his father's brand new car and left the country. Through the conventional Implicature of Prof Hassan's statements, we are able to establish the moral rectitude of this young man who would stop at nothing to accomplish their selfish and inordinate ambition in life. This is the kind of leaders of tomorrow that would

steal and embezzle government finances and channel same into personal enrichment p.56. Serial no. 8, are statements of the president of NAS. His statements implicate the rot in the educational system from primary to the university level. The effects of corruption on educational system: substandard classroom building, lack of regular payment of teachers' salaries, lack of labouratories and other learning facilities at the university level and so many other neglects in the educational sector. These interpretations are arrived at through the conventional implicature of the words used by Comrade Falase p. 180 - 186. Serial no.9 and 10, are statements of Comrade Abubakar Bello, the 1st national vice president of NAS. In serial 9, he lambasted the political leadership accusing them of outward and open corruption in all the facets of the society. The old and the young, the religious institutions. the market men and women, the leaders and the led, are all involved in the stinking corruption and different forms of immorality p. 274. In serial 10, he cast his aspersion on the military segment of the Nigerian society whom he alleges are also very corrupt. Many brigadiers and generals have become billionaires through the barrel of the guns. They stage coups in the name of curbing corruption and moral rectitude in the society but at end of the day, they become even worse because they have guns and nobody can challenge them. These findings are arrived at through the conventional and conversational statements of Comrade Abubakar Bello p. 279.

Conclusion and recommendations

The study concludes that corruption and moral decadence are not limited to young or adult but cut across all shades and ages in the Nigerian society. The study also believes that corruption is synonymous with bad governance in Nigerian society. We also conclude that high level intelligibility does not exonerate anybody from bad attitude, behaviour, crime and corruption. In other words professors are involved in bribery and corruption as well as keeping malice and hatred against each other.

The study also concludes that parents who are supposed to lead their children morally are

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themselves bankrupt in moral values. For examples, parents are bribing to get their children out of jail; bribing for their children to pass national exams; and bribing for admission to the university; corruptly buying position for their children in juicy ministries and parastatals such as NNPC,FIRS, CAC, CBN et cetera are all forms of moral decadence in the society.

Recommendation

A reorientation and national rebirth is

recommended for the Nigerian society.

Parents should allow their children to have a say in decisions that concern their future in terms of career choice and marriage.

Parents should not over-pamper their children but inculcate discipline and hard work into them for their future survival.

Parents should lead as example by shunning corruption and having moral integrity.

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
